The Job Interview

Interviewer:

1. *We open at 9.00, but you would be expected to arrive at 8.30 and we close at 6.00 pm. You would be able to leave then. I think I have asked you everything I wanted to. Thank you for coming along to the interview.*
2. Now, do you have any questions you'd like to ask me about the position?
3. Can you tell me what made you reply to our advertisement?
4. Do you know exactly what you would be doing as a shop assistant?
5. Have you any previous work experience?
6. We'll be making our decision next Monday, we'll give you a call.
7. So, you've applied for the Saturday position, right?
8. That about covers it, you would also be responsible for keeping the front of the store tidy. What sort of student do you regard yourself as . . . did you enjoy studying while you were at school?

John:

- a. Well I imagine I would be helping customers, keeping a check on the supplies in the store, and preparing the shop for business.
- b. Yes. I worked part-time at a take-away in the summer holidays.
- c. I suppose I'm a reasonable student. I passed all my exams and I enjoy studying subjects that interest me.

- e. Thank you. When will I know if I have been successful?
- f. Yes. Could you tell me what hours I'd have to work?
- g. Well, I was looking for a part-time job to help me through college. And I think that I'd be really good at this kind of work.
